You will have to be wise and courageous, filled with the faith of your ancestors of old, and overwhelmed with a prophetic desire to right the wrong and set straight the crooked. It is a poor heritage that our generation gives to yours, but fortunately there is still the heritage of our ancestors. Go forth, create well, and may God bless you.

Confirmation rites can have little meaning or significance unless the confirmand, in leaving the religious school, carries away a positive message. In a sense, however, such a message is hard to impart to boys and girls who have completed their courses of study in our religious school over a period of years. Such a message must come from within their own selves. Each individual confirmand has had opportunity to gain a vast wealth of Jewish and religious experiences during the course of religious studies at our school. Such experiences should help mold favorable impressions and instil positive attitudes toward a full Jewish life. When confirmation time is reached the pupil severs his formal attachment to the religious school and becomes a full-fledged individual member of his group. The results of years of training should then be reflected in the future actions and experiences of our youngsters as they begin to live thru the process of growing into manhood and womanhood. We can only hope and wish that they bring credit to all of us. On this occasion I join in expressing my best wishes for their success in all endeavors so that our confirmands may bring glory and reflect credit on themselves and our people.

## A Year Of School Events And Activities

*At the first assembly of the year we were told by Mr. Deutsch, our educational director, that religious school is not all classroom work, and that we are in for a full year of events and programs as well. Now that the year is over we can look back on some of our many activities outside of classroom work in which we had a chance to participate.*

### BREAKFAST MINYAN

• Some of us—boys about to become Bar Mitzvah and boys who have become Bar Mitzvah—will long remember our Sunday morning breakfast minyans. We gathered in one of the rooms where we put on a tallis and t'fillin and, led by Mr. Deutsch, we took part in a week-day morning service. At the conclusion of this service we entered our "dining room" which, in this case, was the kitchen; and after saying together the "hamotzi" we took part in a hearty breakfast prepared by a committee of mothers. We then all recited together the "birchas hamozon" and were ready for another session of classroom work. There were no girls in this group which is, perhaps, one of the reasons we enjoyed this activity so much.

### CHANUKAH PROGRAM

• We will long remember the Chanukah program this year. For one thing, not all of us had the same program. We realized that what might interest a younger group of students would not interest an older group. So we divided our program this year. The younger group had an enjoyable time participating in a Punch and Judy show on a Chanukah theme and receiving favors and gifts. The older pupils had a Chanukah square dance during the evening of Chanukah and we certainly enjoyed it. We also received candles and menorahs so that we were able to observe the celebration at home. We did enjoy our square dance, with a professional caller, which was held in our vestry room. We came dressed for the occasion but some of the boys were bashful and the girls had to urge them to join in the dancing.

### KEREN AMI

• Each Sunday morning we started the day right by showing that we thought of others less fortunate than we. We all contributed part of our allowance toward a general "Keren Ami" fund so that at the end of the year money would be able to be used to help others less fortunate than we. In each class we collected the sums brought by the pupils and the total amount was put into an envelope which was then handed in to the office. Our chief beneficiary is the United Jewish Appeal but allocations are also made to other worthy charitable institutions.

### PURIM CARNIVAL

• Our Purim carnival was a wow. Mr. Deutsch outlined the program to a group of concessionaires and then we went to work. For one afternoon our vestry room was transformed into a miniature Coney Island. There were games and contests galore. "Hit Haman" and "Bomb Shushan" competed with various dart games, penny pitches, and other games of skill. For 3 hours we competed and there were prizes for winners. For those of us who got hungry there were hot dogs, soda, Haman taschan, but who had time to eat? We hardly realized that time passed so fast when we celebrated Purim in such festive manner. We had our own "little theatre" at which sport pictures and cartoons were shown. When the after-

noon was over we realized we had one of the most enjoyable days in our young lives.

### MODEL SEDER

• Our Model Seder was scheduled after we studied about the holiday in class. Tables were especially decorated for the purpose and when we came to school that Sunday morning we hardly recognized the place. Decorations indicating the Passover idea greeted our sight wherever we looked. We had special hats. The tables were beautifully decorated. Mr. Deutsch had prepared a special Haguda for our use. The leaders of the Seder were on the stage. Many mothers, led by Mrs. Sarah Miller and Mrs. Bess Goldstein, helped serve real wine and fish and macaroons and matzos, and eggs, and other Passover delicacies. We all joined in the singing of all the Passover songs and really learned "by doing." We had a good time doing what we learned about the holiday of Passover.

### SATURDAY SERVICES

• Every Saturday morning about a hundred of us gathered for Saturday morning services conducted by Rabbi Greenfeld, during which we joined in all the prayers and took part in the musical portion of the services. Very frequently those of us who were Bar Mitzvah or Bas Mitzvah were called to the Torah to recite the blessing. When there was a Bar Mitzvah or Bas Mitzvah—and there were many of them—we then went downstairs where we took part in a "kiddush" in honor of the occasion. By taking part in the Saturday morning services we not only indicated that we are part of the Jewish people and expressing our religion by worship, but we also learned a great deal by getting to know more and more the meaning and significance of the prayers we said.

### MID-YEAR EXAMINATIONS

• Frankly we don't like exams. Who does? But, like medicine, they are necessary on certain occasions. Mr. Deutsch explained to us that our term mark is determined by our mid-year exam, the final exam, and the classroom work evaluation. Our exams were mimeographed and, to prepare, we had to study a great deal. Most of us did very well but some of us realized we have to concentrate much more to be among the highest in the class. Our teachers told us our grades and we determined to constantly aim to improve.

### REPORT CARDS

• Following our mid-year examinations, when our teachers began to know us quite well, our parents received detailed report cards indicating the teachers' estimation of our work and efforts. Our test marks were indicated, as well as information pertaining to our conduct, effort, improvement, progress, co-operation, and other matters which make up our work. Some of our parents had frank discussions with us when they felt we could improve in some phase of our work. Our teachers tried to be

very fair in reporting our efforts to our parents and we, too, were able to see in what part of our work we can stand improvement.

## MUSIC ASSEMBLIES

• Our assemblies were devoted mostly to Jewish music. Led by our cantor, Myro Glass, and our music director, Walter Goldmann, we learned many ritual songs as well as folk melodies, Israeli songs, and songs from the prayerbook. Mr. Deutsch explained to us at the beginning of the year the purpose of our music assemblies and Rabbi Greenfeld explained to us the meaning of the songs which we sang. We also learned many Hebrew and English holiday songs and memorized some of them.

## CANDLE LIGHTING

• The girls in the upper grades were not able to come to the breakfast minyan which was organized for the boys and, not wanting to miss out on the chance of carrying out a ritual observance, were given the opportunity to light the candles at home Friday evening. Mr. Deutsch prepared all the necessary information and instruction and even provided the girls with candles and candlesticks, together with a record form to be kept by the girls in fulfilling this ritual. During the first few weeks more than 90% of the girls complied with the new innovation and indicated that they were fulfilling this ritual at home.

## HIGH HOLIDAY SERVICES

• There were 2 different groups participating in the High Holy Day services organized for pupils and graduates of our religious school. A children's service was held on Rosh Hashona and Yom Kippur in the congregation's vesty room, led by Mr. Intrater and Mr. Lichterman. Mr. Deutsch, assisted by Harold Cohen, led the services for teen-agers in the annex building. The services were marked by good decorum and by the fact that they were well planned and meaningful to all who participated.

## HOLIDAY OBSERVANCES

• Religious school pupils had a chance to play a major role during the celebration of Sukkos and Simchas Torah. Our congregation built a Sikkah right next to the congregation building and children had opportunity to take part of refreshments in the Sikkah after they recited the appropriate "b'rochus" and listened to the Kiddush. On Simchas Torah the children all received flags which they waved gayly during the "Hakufos." On Purim the children listened to the reading of the Megillah and almost deafened Haman with their "groggers" which were supplied to all children who attended. On Passover, at the Congregational Seder, the children present had a chance to find the "afkomen" and ransom it by demanding prizes which they got.

## CLASS, SCHOOL ELECTIONS

• Not too much time passed at the beginning of the school year when an election was held at the school. Each class elected its own officers and duties were assigned to the class officers. There was an election campaign for school officers with each candidate having a politician speak in his behalf. Our school officers this year, however, didn't show too much initiative and functioned only when they were called

upon to do so. We hope the school officers next year will show some initiative and be able to introduce ideas of their own and not wait for the faculty members to give the ideas to them.

## SCHOOL PICNIC

• It rained the first Sunday when our picnic was scheduled. But Mr. Deutsch anticipated such a possibility so we had all our information and instruction in advance—that in case of rain the picnic would be held the following Sunday. That week it rained on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday. On Saturday it cleared up and dried the ground. On Sunday, picnic day, we had the nicest day of the year. Chartered buses took us to Broad Ripple Park where a well-planned picnic took place. The senior boys trimmed the faculty in a baseball game, 22-6. The younger children had ponies and a real pony track. Volleyball, baseball, racing—all were in the program. We brought our own lunches and had an outstanding swell time. The buses brought us back after a day of fun and excitement.

## SCHOOL CHOIR

• Mr. Deutsch announced that a school choir will be organized this year and instructed candidates to apply to Mr. Walter Goldmann, our musical director. The candidates were tested and a group chosen. Rehearsals were held once a week and the choir gained a repertoire of many Hebrew songs. They entertained us on Passover and were scheduled to take part at our closing assembly. Most of the year was spent in training and next year they should be in shape to really give out with their talents.

## SIDRA REVIEW, SERMONETTES

• Pupils in the Confirmation class had the assignment of preparing a Sidra review for each Saturday. The rabbi called upon such pupils to present the Sidra review to the congregants, which was followed by the Torah reading and a sermonette by a different pupil. The confirmands needed much help in preparing these assignments but the congregants were not disappointed by their efforts.

## POINT SYSTEM

• Our religious school operates on a point system in the final 3 years of our studies. We are allowed certain points for various aspects of our school life. A mimeographed list has been provided us and we are all trying to meet the minimum number required. Our standing in class is also affected by the number of points we get. To be confirmed there are certain requirements and we have 3 years in which to meet them.

## BIBLE CLASS

• To those of us who are past 13 and who no longer attend the daily religious school we are required to attend at least one week-day, in addition to Sunday, a class in which the major study is Bible. One group meets with the rabbi and the other group meets with Mr. Deutsch, during which a study course on the Bible is taken up. We have our regular examinations and are using the English translation of the Bible as a text to illustrate our various studies about the Bible. We also learn a Biblical vocabulary to make it easier for us to read and understand the Bible.
